SPRING BREAKUP ON THE YUKON **RIVER MAY 2009**

Breakup this year began on Sunday the 3rd of May. Some of the contributing factors included a higher than usual water level at freeze up in mid-November and a movement of ice lasting several hours the day after it had stopped moving. This forced ice up against the banks and the ugliest jumble I had seen in some 40 years. Also by early April the ice measured a good 5 feet thick, and by the end of the month when the temperature reached well into the 70s the ice had not deteriorated. Then the volume of water began to lift the ice, and it did not crumble as it usually does.





The ice jammed and flooding over the bank was the result. During the next 4 days the water level dropped and rose several times so a crew was able to relay out the back door of the grocery store into a front end loader loads of groceries. This loader was also used to meet the mail plane as the water was over the road too deep to drive anything else. On the 7th of May a push of ice and more water came from upstream and forced the jammed ice well over

the bank, which caused the destruction of many buildings while pushing others back off their foundations along with tearing down trees and smashing vehicles. Up till then it had been serious water damage only, and we hoped that the river below would open up and the worst would be over.

This last push of water and ice completely cleared away all the buildings in the native village 3 miles up stream and left behind an ice field 5 to 20 feet deep





along the bank for many miles up and down the river taking down trees hundreds of feet back and stripping off a number of islands above and below us. A month later in June much of this ice was still packed in place making it all but impossible to get in and see what could be salvaged.

Soon volunteers began to arrive including folks from Dawson City who had their own flood in 1979. Food and clothing and other goods followed. These volunteers and victims were fed and bedded down at the school. FEMA arranged for a contractor from Fairbanks to come in with big


equipment to clear out the road to the village and open up access to the damaged buildings to make it possible to clean out what was salvageable, and then demolish them, haul it away and bury it

FEMA brought in men from the Mennonite Disaster crew who are in the business of recovery work. Also Samaritans Purse brought work crews in to help put up the cabins and houses that replaced the ones destroyed. By mid September, 13 of these structures were enclosed and all but ready to be occupied.

That's the short version of what went on this summer. The store is now open in a different building. Fuel is available. The road has been rebuilt, electric and phone service has been restored



and everyone has a roof over their heads. Winter is holding off, at least as of the 15th of Oct. We are very grateful to all who have made this possible with no one being hurt. There is no café, and I don't know when there will be. The B&B is open for business. We are looking forward to a quiet winter and hopefully a less eventful breakup in 2010. Ron will see about including in here photos of what ice can do to the cars and trucks that didn't have a chance to get out of the way. Come see us next summer.

PROPOSED 2010 ADVENTURE BEFORE DEMENTIA TOUR

Following are my preliminary thoughts regarding a VLNAAC tour to Cordova, Whittier, etc. I've proposed our tour to occur in late July to avoid conflicts with other events. Ferry costs for two adults & a vehicle less than 19 feet are \$511. Deduct about \$24 if your vehicle is 15 feet or less in total length.

- Sun. July 25: Drive 266 miles to the historic Copper Center Lodge or stop in Glennallen.
- Mon. July 26: Drive 100 miles to Valdez & catch the fast ferry (3:30 p.m. check in) to Cordova & arrive at 7:15 p.m. Stay at the Reluctant Fisherman Inn overlooking the harbor.
- Tue. July 27: Tour Cordova area (harbor, walking tour, art tour, museum, USCG vessel, PWS Science Center, Mt. Eyak Ski Area, etc.).
- Wed. July 28: Drive 100 miles round trip on the scenic Copper River Highway to the Child's Glacier Have a picnic lunch & drive across the historic Million Dollar Bridge for a group photo.
- Thurs. July 29: Depart at 8:30 a.m. for Whittier again on the fast ferry & arrive at 11:45 a.m. Tour Whittier Museum, drive through the RR tunnel to the Portage Glacier Visitor Center & then on to Girdwood & the Alyeska Ski Resort (about 26 miles driving). Stay at the Hotel. Ride the chairlift up the mountain & walk/drive the resort area. Dine at the Double Musky Restaurant that evening & have breakfast at the Bakery as they are both outstanding.
- Fri. July 30: Tour Howard & Barb Hansen's car collection & possibly visit the Brown's Car & Transportation Museum in Anchorage before driving the Glenn Highway to the foot of the Matanuska Glacier & then on to the wonderful Majestic Valley Lodge for the night. Total driving is about 220 miles.
- Sat. July 31: Drive the return 317 miles to Fairbanks as a group.

I tried to keep the tour as short as possible & to occur within the same week. I chose to return via the highly scenic Glenn Hwy. to allow those interested to drop a trailer in the Glennallen or Copper Center Area & continue on with their elder vehicles. An alternative would be to take the incredibly scenic Hatcher Pass Road north of Palmer, stay overnight at the lodge & return via the Parks Highway. 

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X-8 ENGINE BUILT BY HENRY FORD IN 1925

This engine is documented as the final design of the experimental air-cooled prototype radial X-8 engine conceived by Henry Ford in1918. He built the first X-8 in 1919 and built a special car, named the X-Car, to road test it in. After many design changes, he then built the second and final X-8 engine in 1925, which is the one pictured here. It was secretly tested in an Oldsmobile and driven around Detroit. This X-8 had the greatest appeal to Mr. Ford of both his air-cooled and watercooled designs which he considered in the 1920s to replace the four cylinder engine in his popular Model T. After test driving this exact X-8 engine in an Oldsmobile for nearly a year, Henry Ford decided his engine needed more power and eventually developed the flathead V-8 design which he introduced in 1932 and used through 1953.
