

with all the T's that first Vernon and then Gary have restored and maintained.


Clubmembers know that

(Gary's father) was one of the charter members of the club. When the club first registered as a chapter of the Horseless Carriage

Club of America, Vern's 1915 Model T Dumptruck was listed as one of the five 1915 vintage cars that were needed to meet the criteria for the club charter. Vern was the club's first Secretary.

There are four Nash Ts: the 1915 T Truck, and three 1926 Ts—a Touring, a Coupe and a Roadster. An article that Vern wrote about restoring the '26 Touring is reprinted on page 2.

RESTORING OF A 1926 MODEL T TOURING

Reprinted from the first issue of the Club newsletter, Arctic Tracks, in November, 1971

In the winter of 1966 and 1967 I was in Spokane, Wash. And found a 1926 motor for a 1926 T. I bought it and my brother-in -law moved it for me to a place called the antique Ranch that makes a business of old car parts and working on motors. They gave it a complete overhaul and it is a good thing that they are slow, because it didn't arrive up here before the flood. When it got here, I told everyone "there is my Model T Touring car".

Next, I bought a basket case from Colin McDonald to get me some parts. I had a good frame, 2 fenders, a front end, and a radiator to fix. The wheels I made 4 good ones out of 6 and needed 2 more rims. I started to order little pieces from ads I found in Hemmings News. I could find almost everything but a body and windshield frame and posts. My brother-in-law in Spokane found one in North Dakota and made a trip over and picket it up for me, but what a rusty mess and full of rust holes! One post was broken but they looked good to me anyhow. I the meantime I wrote letters for a whole winter and found two more touring bodies. One in Denver, Colorado, and one in Nebraska. They were in the same price range, but the one in Colorado said he would take the rust off and prime it for me for a price. So I sent him the money and he said it would be ready in the spring and then I worried all winter how to get it here, it ended up I had a pickup delivered in Denver and flew down, got the pickup then drove over and picked it up, plus two back fenders in good shape and my top bows that are hard to come by. There was no trouble on the trip that took me a week. Up to this time three years had passed, all the pieces were cleaned and primed and I only needed a hood. My son and I got busy and put the pieces together and had the motor running after soldering the gas tank up twice and finding out where all the wires went for sure. I had the top and upholstery ready made, and ordered from Indiana, when it arrived. Clem from Clem's Upholstery Shop helped me put it together. We then drove it over and had it painted. I found a hood that was full of holes from target shooters and a hinge gone, but it was ok.

We were in the parade in 1970.

RESTORING MY 1929 FORD ROADSTER

After watching several of my friends rebuild old cars, I decided that I wanted to buy a project car to restore. In mid November 2007, Jerry Krier told me about a Model A Roadster that was for sale. Jerry hooked me up with the owner, John Thomas and I made arrangements to go look at the car.

The car had been purchased 27 years earlier by Thomas who brought it to his garage, disassembled it and then began to reassemble the car. The frame was painted and the engine, transmission, cowling and steering column were installed in the frame. At that point, the restoration came to a halt and the other parts

were boxed up and stored in the garage. They remained in that state until I decided to buy the car.

We loaded the chassis and

its attached parts onto a car trailer for like a bath tub as everything from a shipment home. The rest of the car consisted of several pickup loads of parts. The rest of the body parts were very rusty and went straight into the dumpster. I learned that the car had been owned by William and Dorothy Sherman up until 1970 and was stored uncovered out by the airport for many years. I suspect that it went through the 1967 flood and filled up



didn't smoke. We were delighted in thinking that we didn't need an engine overhaul.

I spent a lot of time cleaning and applying POR-15 to the inside and underside of the car. I bought new fenders for it and started on the body work. It took me months to get all the missing parts. Even though all the parts I bought for the car were new, we had to assemble and disassemble them several times to get the wood, fenders, running boards, doors, etc to fit right. This is not an easy job after eighty years of car use and abuse and buying parts that are no longer pro-



duced in Henry Ford's foundry. The new rear fenders were so different that I ended up buying a third rear fender to cut up for parts so I could match the different curves, length, and side-to-side roll that allowed the fenders to match.

After more assembly and reassem-

bly and hours of sanding, grinding and fitting we had the body ready for paint. We primed it and applied base coat /



clear coat paint to the car. We no sooner than finished the painting, opened the garage door to get some air Babbitt bearings poured and maand here came the neighborhood squirrel. He jumped on the car and left fresh track across the cowl and fuel tank to christen the new paint. After some choice words about squirrels, I decided that we would have to do lots more sanding and repainting to make it right. Thinking back on it, for the amount of work it took to fix, I should have gold leafed the tracks for that oneof-a-kind custom look.

Our squirrel repair was completed after lots of hours of sanding, reassembly and repainting. This led us to final car assembly and mechanical checks. This time when we started the car, everything didn't go as well as planned. After starting the engine, the transmission locked up. We drained the transmission oil and several gear teeth fell out of the drain hole so a new clutch

and tranny were installed.

With the car finally finished, it was time to drive the car from my brother Bill's shop to my house. The car started smoking a lot on the way. The next day, I pulled the head to check out the problem and there was a puddle of oil on the top of each piston. I could put a 45 thousands feeler gage between the pistons and cylinder walls. To check further, I dropped the oil pan to see nails in rod cap bolts instead of cotter pins. Total engine rebuild was in order.

Everything from the head to the pan is now all new including new chined by my brother Bill Wright. The engine was started in a test stand upon completion of the rebuild and run several times before reinstallation in the car. The car took three and one half years to complete and runs and drives beautifully.

fan. Needles to say the food in New Orleans was excellent and included coffee and beignets at Café Du Maude.


