For exhibit A, we offer for your consideration one Mr. Stickley Honeybun. Stickley was a Franklin man for his whole life. He remembered the cars when they were on the road during the War, and later bought his own to enjoy in the new old car hobby. He eventually owned a number of nice cars, drove several and accumulated a large collection of parts as they became available, everything from nuts & bolts, to engines and entire chassis. As he went on in years he continued to attend the Trek, enjoyed the publications (especially the Service Station) and although his days of driving were about over, enjoyed spending time in his garage to reminisce.

Mr. Honeybun eventually died. His wife predeceased him which left three children to dispose of his estate. Try as he might have, the children never acquired an interest in the cars and though the old man was a little nuts. Now faced with four Franklins and a small mountain of old car parts, the children sold the four cars to a dealer and had all the parts—that “rusty junk” hauled away as scrap. The kids divided the case and went to Vegas. The Franklin community lost a considerable resource.

Exhibit B we shall call Mr. Gates. Rusty and his wife Pearly enjoyed Franklins since the 1930's. In those days, people who owned these strange old cars would bring them to Mr. Gates for repair, so he established a business as a Franklin repair man. He had a good reputation and people would sell or even give him parts for his warehouse.

Rusty was in his late-80's on the day he climbed a ladder to stash away a Series 13 cylinder. He became lightheaded and held onto the rails of the ladder for as long as he could but eventually he passed out. They say that he was dead by the time he hit the ground. Everyone grieved at the loss of such a fine man. With no plans for his own demise, the shop remained unattended for a year until the widow was approached with an offer to buy all the parts. Not knowing what to do, she sold the whole warehouse to the man, assured that he would make them available to Franklin owners as Rusty had. An 18-wheel moving van came to haul the entire load away to an obscure small town in northeast Coleslawania. That was thirty years ago. Perhaps

the new owner was overwhelmed with storing and sorting through the parts, or got caught up with life as we all do. The Franklin community lost a considerable resource.

For Exhibit C, meet Mr. Cracker. Graham also got involved with Franklins as a young man when he returned from Europe after the War. Always interested in old cars, after landing a good job and finding a place of his own he began to buy and sell cars and accumulate parts when they became available, often being found at the roadside as they were in those days. The years went on and although never a wealthy man, Mr. Cracker became well known as a friendly and helpful fellow, always willing to offer advice, to take on volunteer projects, or to make his parts available to anyone who needed them. Although a quiet fellow, he had a great many friends and seemed to enjoy his simple life.

Mr. Cracker closed the book on a life well lived just shy of 91 year old. When his heirs came to clean out the house and put it on the market, all they found was one ratty old Franklin Coupe, a tool box, and enough parts to fit in the trunk of the car. But wait, didn't Uncle Graham have a barn full of Franklin parts? The heirs were expecting a “pile of gold” but instead found nothing. Mr. Cracker had sold, or in most cases given away, everything he didn't need for his own car, and toward the end had given away what he figured he would never get to use himself.

Nominations for 2013 “Most Improved Vehicle” Award are open

Nominations are open for cars and their owners eligible in 2013. Traditionally, the judging committee is chaired by the prior year's winner. Charlie Jurgens won in 2012 and is this year's chair. He will organize a judging team made up of several of the award's prior winners, and he will present the award at the annual Holiday Party and Annual Meeting on December 8th at the Westmark.

Charlie and the award committee will be looking for the following information from club members who would like for their restoration work to be considered:

- 1) Year, make, and model of the car.
- 2) Before and after photos (the after photos are the most important for the judging).
- 3) A brief summary of the work done, approximately when the work was done, and what hands-on work was performed by the club-member owner.

It is that time of year that a very special committee in the club, made up of the past winners of the Vernon L. Nash Antique Auto Club's Most Improved Vehicle Award, start to work to find a winner for 2013.

The award was started in 2005 by then Club President, Willy Vinton. When asked about his inspiration for starting the award, Willy said the goal with the award was to give folks an incentive to do some restoration work,

In preparation for the second annual award, Ron Allen worked with Willy to formalize the eligibility and judging requirements. As a minimum for consideration, the car must be a classic or antique as permitted by the AACA for membership, it must become finished (or nearly finished) sometime in the current year (2013), and must have a significant amount of hand-on work done by the owner. Modifications from the original design for uniqueness or high performance should neither add nor deduct scoring points.

There are four Judging Criteria. Each carries approximately equal scoring weight in the collective judgment of the committee. The four criteria are:

- 1) The total improvement done to the vehicle from the time of the owner's start of restoration to the completion in 2013.
- 2) The amount of hands-on work performed by the owner.
- 3) The quality of the work done.
- 4) The reason for the owner's interest in the car, the associated story, history, or etc.

Unusual challenges, difficulties, and successes should be mentioned.

- 4) Human interest information about the car—Why or how the owner obtained it, the history of the car or history of the owner with the car, etc.

This material can be e-mailed to Charlie or one of the judges, mailed, or hand delivered at one of the club meetings. Once the award

Touring. A popular way members enjoy their dream vehicle. They were built to drive and enjoy and there are those that do just that. I have heard them say, "You won't catch my car on a show field." The same can be said for the avid vehicle shower.

Maintenance. All mechanical machines need it. From oil change to greasing, tuning up and of course pampering with wax and cloth. Rubbing on them becomes an addiction.

Recruitment. Aw, here's one I bet you hadn't thought of. Your membership proves you are proud to be associated with the world's oldest and largest antique automobile club. Recruiting new members should be an easy task; sharing your experiences and enthusiasm for the club would excite potential members into joining.
