
am confident that the donation will take place, and by the next time we meet it should an accomplished fact! - Jeff Creamer

#### **WORK IN PROGRESS**

A hobby is a regular activity that is done for enjoyment, typically during one's leisure time. My current hobby is building a very unique non typical custom hot rod. Starting with a 1997 Dodge Ram 2500 w/ 4WD with a 5.9 Cummins 12v, I stripped off all the Sheetmetal and sold that portion. I kept the chasis and powertrain intact and complete including the Diesel / auto tranny. I am sticking a 1937 one and half ton Chevy cab on it with a homemade bed (yet to be designed).

About three feet is being cut out of the 1997 Ram frame. I estimate the end product to be 1,000lbs lighter then the donor Ram was.

Nothing on the chassis / powertrain / drive line will change except the driveshaft length other than rebuilding. My intent is to stand on the shoulders of 1.424 design engineers and test drivers at Mopar and capitalize on there great time tested beloved Ram truck. I specifically picked the 1997 Dodge Ram 2500 5.9 4wd because every article I read said that specific truck is one to pick.

Going into this project I understand there are substantial challenges ahead (makes me feel alive), I am in an new arena! I have crossed the Rubicon River, hence a hobby.

The starting line was August 15, 2018. Projected completion September 2020. Current status:

- Engine modifications done, painted, and reassembly starting March 30. I wanted something with a little Snort to it, originally it had 180 hp Projected is 400hp.
- Transmission and transfer box rebuilt with a few installed mentioned goodies.

- Both differentials have been completely disassembled, rebuilt, painted and reinstalled including ABS brakes.
- Cab has been repaired and rebuilt, done and ready to bolt down.

The word "ABSURE" comes to mind and may be on the license plate.

Again my intent is a class in its own at the show!

To me, building the hot rod is 88.5% of the fun. Driving and showing it is the the balance. The internet is my backup for YouTube how to videos.

I have been told by many a professional this would be hard. They're pointing out the obvious. I like hard. Please just keep telling me I can't do it! It makes my day.

I can't wait to show up at Cars and Coffee one Saturday @ -40f in my 4wd hot rod 🙉 🖎 🖺 🖪. Yes it will be a daily driver, for all 12 months.



### FREE WHEELING

Freewheeling was a non-overdrive option that was available on many cars from the fall of 1930 through 1933, then went away. It also got adapted as a word almost immediately to describe a style or attitude and became so pervasive in use that today, that the dictionary ignores the real source of the word and only has definitions and examples related to "free and loose in form or manner", "heedless of social norms or niceties", "not repressed or restrained", "loose and undisciplined", etc.


Patent 2010718 was granted to the Studebaker Corporation in November 1930 for a "Freewheeling Transmission" as assigned by Guy M. Hartsock of South Bend, Indiana. The patent is quite detailed and complete in showing the over-running clutch and other arrangements required for the unit. Object of the invention was to "provide a novel form of overrunning clutch structure in a variable speed transmission mechanism to provide free wheeling at certain speed settings"

When an equipped car is operated with Freewheeling engaged, two things happen: 1) the car has no "engine braking" in that when the car's driveshaft is going faster than the engine rpms would drive it, the transmission disengages and the car coasts, and 2) when above just a few mph the car can be both upshifted and downshifted between 2<sup>nd</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> without engaging the clutch (so if you do "California stops" you gaged (some are still on the books in many never need the clutch except to get started the first time!).

Automakers claimed better mileage when using freewheeling - most citing 12% as average fuel improvement and also claiming 20% reduced oil consumption.

Studebaker first introduced Freewheeling on select models for the 1931 year and then really promoted it along with Fast-Action Synchronized Shifting on its cars in

> 1932 (along with safety glass all-around, Startix, all cars bodies wired for radio. and many other new fea-Studebaker had tures). Freewheeling on its cars in 1931 through 1933 only. By 1932 it was also offered by Auburn, Pierce Arrow, Packard, Franklin, and Chevrolet – and through 1934 on some Dodge models. If engaged, the car would quickly coast faster than the engine speed on a downhill. With no engine braking, and with most cars still having mechanical brakes requiring much pe-



dal pressure added to a tendency to fade when hot, long steep hills became very dangerous. And drivers of cars with freewheeling caused lots of accidents at intersections as drivers didn't anticipate the braking force required without the engine engaged.

A number of States passed laws states), and there was lots of negative publicity about accidents caused by use of Freewheeling. By late 1934, no auto manufacturer offered the feature and it wasn't seen again until a few years later on the Borg-Warner Overdrive, which depended on it. But, with the overdrive transmission, freewheeling would disengage when the OD disengaged, and was thus a bit safer.

Freewheeling is important for bicycles - you want the wheels to keep turning when you stop pedaling. Technically, freewheeling, is also a key invention which is key to the automatic transmission. Today, most automatic transmissions are freewheeling in all gears lower than the selected gear, which is why you can manually downshift the selector at speed to provide more engine braking on hills. But you don't find cars with freewheeling manual transmissions after early 1934.

I have freewheeling on my '32 Studebaker Dictator. It's great for parades! It is also good for short stop-and-go driving between stoplights or signs in a crowded neighborhood. like downtown. I can tell you from experience, however, that it is scary (and hard on the knee of your braking leg) on steep downhills...





Windshield Repair

Upper halves of windshields do not always stay put, especially when worn; there is a tendency for the upper section to fall over. In the construction shown, the position of this part is determined by a pair of discs at each end. These are held in contact by stiff coil springs, and additional friction is obtained by having a series of raised points on one disk and cupped ones on the other. Sometimes the springs may be adjusted; but if not, or if this is not sufficient, a leather washer placed as shown will do the trick. - S.P.M

### POOLS TO BE DIVIDED

FAIRBANKS, Alaska, April 26.— The Fairbanks and Nenana ice pools, which have grown to considerable proportions, will be divided half and half between charity and the winner. The pools are formed each year by Alaskans desiring to wager as to the time the ice will break in the Tanana river. More than \$2000 is already in the pool here.

# Fairbanks Looks for Big Year for Mines

Fairbanks, Alaska, April 19.—Considerable progress in the quartz mining activities of this camp is the outlook for the year 1919, with a resultant increase in the production of gold, according to mining authorities.

In the Ester district prospects are especially promising. There several satisfactory hundred ton mill run tests were made at the Eva mill, as a result of which it is said at least two more mills will be shipped in "from the outside" upon the epening of navigation. On the Smith, Mohawk and other claims on Eva creek much development work has been conducted during the winter, and a number of claims have each several hundred tons of ore ready for the first spring runs of the mills.

# RAFFLE CAR PROGRESS

The 1960 Falcon two-door wagon raffle car has been providing weekend entertainment for club members electing to assist and learn some new restoration tricks at the same time.
