Horseless Carriage Club rolling along in Fairbanks

Stand back you drivers of luxury sedans. The Horseless Carriage Club of Fairbanks has been formed.

The club has been chartered under the National Horseless Carriage Club of America and is as legitimate as a horseless carriage can be. The horseless carriage group was formed recently when a group of antique car buffs got together and found that among those present five or more Fairbanksans owned vintage cars built prior to 1915.

With the cars of Vern Nash, J. C. McGuire, Colin MacDonald, Charles Creamer and George Clayton registered in the state it was possible to apply for a charter in the national organization.

The charter was granted under the name of Horseless Carriage Club, Fairbanks Regional Group. It is now the farthest north group to receive a charter.

A meeting was held with the last Thursday of each month being designated as meeting night, with the meeting location to be announced.

Officers elected were Howard Mackey, president; George Clayton, vice president; Vern Nash, secretary; Robert Giinther, treasurer and Merle Branham, Jerry Hassel and Fred Hupprich as board members.

Anyone interested in joining the club may do so regardless of the vintage automobile they have, however, you must have a vehicle prior to a 1942 model for voting membership.
