First was a nice dark green WK 70.

This was followed by an even better maroon WK 70B. then suddenly both of these were set aside when Bob found his dream car; a big beautiful Brown/Brown/Orange 1930 66B.

This car had been given a total restoration with each and every piece being refinished or replaced. With its new plush upholstery, dual side mounts and acres of chrome its easy to see why Bob liked it so much.

Bob really pampered his new 66B. For starters it wasn't trucked or boated up to Alaska, it was flown up in a C130 cargo plane. He kept it under its own velvet lined cover in a heated garage and only brought it out once or twice a year for a short trip to the local parade or car show. Bernie knew of my interest in the WOKR and asked if I'd help him sell the car by running a for-sale ad in our National Newsletter.


