Tanana Valley Fair—no car show






1931 Model A: In Progress by Don Oines




The aboveModel A coupe was purchased from George Clayton in Oct. of 03. When asked if he knew any history on the car he said he had purchased it in Colorado and brought it up a couple years ago. His "couple years ago" reminds me of when I purchased the Model A town car I now have. The seller said he had driven it down from Central either 14 or 24 years earlier, but he couldn't remember which. So much for the "couple years".

Since the weather was still warm, my son and I began to disassemble the car for restoration. It started out looking to be simple, involving a new paint



job, new interior, and installing the rebuilt engine still in the crate from "Egge." However the situation deteriorated rapidly as the disassembly progressed and we found numerous rust-throughs on the body requiring patch panels. They had been patched with body filler previously. In fact we found the entire car



had been buttered with bondo.

After removal of the body the chassis was pulled into "José's" for steam cleaning and sandblasting. Meanwhile I had sent off for all the patch panels for the body. I continued to disassemble the body, removing everything that was removable including the top and top wood, as it was rotted out.

After retrieving the chassis from José we lifted what was left of the body into my pickup and hauled it in for sandblasting also. The day that we got the body back from sandblasting was the day the weather turned sub-zero. This put a halt to my work in the shop as it's hard to heat at those temperatures.

I found another warm place to continue stripping



the paint from the other components. At the time of this writing, I have finished that chore but the weather still hasn't warmed. For the next stage I plan to assemble and install the engine

and then go to work on the brakes. Someone started a conversion to hydraulics but never finished it. I'm not sure what I'll find once I open up the wheel drums. After completing the chassis I will return to the body, install new wood in the roof, install patch panels, remove minor dents and then paint and put in a new interior.


