

I just got off the phone with Angie from the Carlson Center, and they were ready to set up for next year. We




tentatively set the date for Aug 26, 27, and 28th, 2005. The Old Engine Club members came by today and said they are eager to do it again, and Carquest added their voice to





October Notes from the President

On Margaret's and my recent visit to German, most of the highlights centered around such things as castles, vineyards, half-timbered houses, quiet waterways, and ratskellers featuring truly authentic foods. But it is always inter-

esting to keep an eye out for old cars, and this trip was no exception.


During our time in Berlin, we found a striking contrast between crude functionality and well-designed elegance. An example of the first was a Trabant, built in the former East Germany between the 50's and the 80's and called by one writer "one of the biggest mistakes in automobile history." We found several Trabants lined up on a street in early morning, awaiting their use as a means of tour transportation for wary tourists. These are three-cylinder, two-cycle cars that use a mixture of gas and oil,



just like your chain saw. We were amused that they were very noisy when being started and even noisier while running. Some of them could not even be started, despite much grinding of starters, opening and closing of hoods, and gnashing of teeth (similar, of course, to a few VLNAAC vehicles!). And each made a substantial contribution to Berlin's air pollution.

In contrast, we found a beautiful 1927 Bentley "Speed Six" on display in a showroom near some new vehicles in one of the city's up-scale neighborhoods. This classic British car claims 61/2 liters, 6 cylinders, and 180 BHP. It was in pristine condition, was presided-over by a Bentley representative, and reminded us of some of the vehicles seen in museums in New Zealand and England.

Audis abound throughout Germany, and we saw many examples of several 2005 models (only



some of which will be available in the United States). And one of our travel companions, after seeing a very fancy 2005 Volkswagen camper on display, has almost decided to acquire one for his use in the eastern US. But these last two marques will have to wait until 2030 before they deserve further mention in on old car rag.

Many thanks to those who coordinated the club's September activities during our absence.


