DOMKE'S 1930 WILLYS-KNIGHT MODEL 66B


Most of us have seen Rudy and Ruth Ann's beautiful Willys-Knight Model 66B that they drive to club events on special occasions, but many of us have not heard about its history. The Domkes purchased the Model 66B from club members Bernie and Judy Saupe in 1996. Bernie and Judy had purchased the car from club member Bob Meritt around 1987. "The Starter" is a national magazine produced by the Willys Overland Knight Registry, which the Domkes have been members of since 1970. The editor of "The Starter" interviewed Bob Meritt and wrote an article about the car. The article's date and editor's name were not printed on the copy presented to me. The article tells the story about the car from the time it was originally purchased in 1930 to the time Bob Meritt purchased it and brought it to Alaska.

Bob Meritt's 1930 Willys-Knight Model 66B

We've all heard of those cold Alaskan nights, but your Editor believes the tale spun for the Registry by member Bob Merritt of Fairbanks, Alaska is the first about a cold Alaskan Knight. The story can best be told to you as Bob told it to me.

The car was originally purchased in Miami, Florida. The Depression hit, so the owner leased it to a Miami Beach resort to haul tourists along the beach until he could again afford the payments. To members who are not aware, this was the large deluxe sedan, made by Willy Overland at a reduced price of \$1,795 in 1930, so it must have fit right in as transportation for rich tourists.

The owner then moved to Kansas and the car was accidentally left out one night in 1934. The water in the engine froze and cracked the block. This accident proved to save the car, because

due to the accident, the car was slid sideways into a storage space in a barn and remained there kept by the owner and then his widow for 34 years. She turned down many offers for the car because she wanted to save it for someone who would truly appreciate their Willys-Knight.

Members Arlie Regier and M. M. Bailey discovered the car in 1965, and Arlie convinced the lady that he was just the person to bring it back to its former state of beauty and elegance. "Sleeve-valve" Bailey, as M. M. Bailey was affectionately dubbed was a Willys-Knight expert, having worked for Willys-Overland for many years. He set about replacing and restoring the engine and other mechanical parts that were worn. Arlie Regier, a metal sculptor by trade, spent five years between his other commissions, working miracles with the body work and paint. Some chrome work was completed, mainly the bumpers and retaining rings on the wheels. Arlie purchased four new Lester whitewall tires.

In 1970 Arlie decided to sell the car to me. I had written him twice about the car and he felt that he was too busy with his other work and could use the funds for his son's education. So we made a deal. The car was delivered to Seattle, Washington from Kansas by Passport Transport. At the time, the Longshoremen's strike had the West Coast ports tied up, so I contracted with an upholsterer to restore the interior.

Choosing the materials was difficult. The closest I could find from the samples was

Mohair seats with side panels and headliner trimmed with 100% English Wool Broadcloth. The material and work was very expensive, but the results were worth it. The interior hardware was dark-bronze plated like the original.

The President ordered the Longshoremen back to work, but the car was in the upholsterer's shop about half finished. So when Bob's Auto Shop was finished, the strike was back on. I contracted with a plating shop in Seattle to remove all the parts to be chromed and do the work of either casting or chrome plating. This was in February, and I had purchased the car in July. At this point had never seen the car except in the pictures Arlie had sent me. Then a pilot friend called me from Seattle and said he had an empty Hercules plane (the type they fly equipment in to the North Slope Oil Fields) leaving for Fairbanks in two hours. I called the upholstery shop and they rushed the car, with half the parts missing (left at the platers) to the airport for loading. Five hours later it was safe in my garage in Fairbanks, not even dusty from its 2,000 mile trip.

When this model 66B is completed it will be a real beauty, and I hope it is worthy of the award "Best in Automotive Styling" that its cousin, the Plaid-side Roadster took at the New York World's Fair in 1930. The reason the car had to be a 1930 W-K model 66B was that this was the same model my grandfather had for 18 years until it was destroyed in 1948.

Ron Allen comment: The 66B has been done many years now, and indeed it is a real beauty.
