### THE FAMILY FORD

Car enthusiasts who attended the Vernon Nash annual car show at the Carlson Center June 3-4, 2006, may have noticed a new addition to the Fairbanks classic car scene. The car, a 1935 Ford Cabriolet, restored by my husband, Kirk Larson, is truly stunning. Its shiny black paint and chrome drew a lot of attention at the show. The real beauty of the car, however, lies in the story behind it.

Back in the mid 40's Kirk's father, Lyle, purchased the Cabriolet from a friend, and it became the family vehicle for many years after that. It was the daily-driver, the car Kirk's mother drove to the supermarket. When the family needed

to tow a travel trailer on vacations, it was the old Ford that did the job. Many of Kirk's stories and memories revolve around this car. I haven't heard them all, but I do recall a story about his mother, not known for her skill behind the wheel or her intellectual prowess, driving the car with the trailer in tow. On that particular drive, Kirk's mother did all she could to outrun the vehicle that was so rudely tailgating her. Only when she reached home did she realize the tailgater was actually attached.

Kirk's father taught him much of what he knows about engines and automobile mechanics on the Cabriolet. He fondly remembers working alongside his dad during numerous engine repairs and tune-ups. The car served as a connection for them, a way of communicating and staying close. Lyle was not the type to express his emotions, but

allowing Kirk to help with the car was on way to show his love for his son.

After years as the main means of transportation, the Cabriolet was eventually stored in the family barn in Weed, California. It was placed in the barn in 1973 due to a blown engine. The car ended up sitting in that barn for nearly 30 years. Lyle eventually towed it to Portland, Oregon in 2000 and began a well-intentioned restoration process. Much needed to be done, and Lyle looked forward to getting the old girl back into tiptop shape.

Almost everyone can think of a family story or memory related to a vehicle. What makes Kirk's story more poignant is the fact that a fading

memory is what inspired him to restore the car. Around the time that his father towed the car to Portland, we started to notice some odd behaviors. His dad started calling quite often, and during his phone calls he would frequently ask the same questions several times. Kirk would patiently answer his questions, trying his best not to get annoyed when he had to give the same answer several times. His father, a man who had spent much of his career as the city manager in a variety of cities including Nome and Dillingham, seemed to be losing his ability to think clearly.

Eventually, after much prodding and cajoling, Lyle went to a doctor for some tests. The test results confirmed our fears when Lyle was diagnosed with Alzheimer's disease. Alzheimer's is a horrible disease for both the sufferer and his family. It is heart wrenching to watch someone you love lose his memories. For Kirk the decline of his father was particularly difficult. His father had never outwardly expressed his love for his son. He connected with Kirk through family stories and sharing memories. Gradually the stories faded from his mind, leaving Kirk a stranger to his own father.

Thankfully, before Lyle's memory faded completely, he sent the old Ford up to Fairbanks. Kirk promised that he would restore the car and keep it in the family. Shortly after receiving the car in 2003, Kirk began the long process of restoration. Due to other projects, like building our home, Kirk did not get serious about the restoration until the fall of 2005.

Although the engine had been repaired and the car was in running condition when it arrived in Fairbanks, there was much to be done. Kirk stripped the car to pieces and began the time consuming task of putting it back together a little at a time. As those who know Kirk can attest, he takes on all his projects with gusto. He has an all or nothing mentality when it comes to building or restoring anything. Every waking moment from 2005 until April of 2006 was spent either physically working on, researching about, or searching for parts for the Ford. Kirk wanted to make it as original as possible, and he meticulously did all the work himself, including the painting and upholstery.

At times, Kirk's obsession with finishing the car was tiresome for our two children and me. After a while, the kids stopped asking where Daddy was; they knew he was in the shop working on the car. It took me a while to figure out what the rush was all about. Eventually Kirk confided that he was trying to complete the car before his father died. By 2006 his father could no longer remember Kirk. As it had when he was a boy, working on the car became Kirk's connection with his father. They weren't physically together, but the time and meticulous care Kirk put into the Cabriolet allowed him to be with his father again in a very special way.

Restoring the Ford was a loving tribute from a man to his father. People who see the car often applaud its beauty and the care with which it was restored, but they do not realize that Kirk's motivation was much deeper than having an eyecatching vehicle. In preserving the car, Kirk was also preserving a lifetime of memories.

As it turns out, Kirk finished the car just in time. It was displayed at the Carlson Center the first weekend in June. Kirk was proud to show the car and share a story or two with all who were

interested. He had accomplished his goal. Maybe in some small way his father was waiting for Kirk to finish his tribute. Lyle Larson left this earth on the morning of June 13, 2006 just ten days after his son showed the world the car they built together.
