Ruth Hill, one of our original members of VLNAACF passed away at the Maui Medical Center after she collapsed in her Condo in Maui. Ruth and her husband, Clain, joined the Fairbanks Alaska Regional Group "Horsless Carriage Club of America" in 1979. The Club was making changes Nationally that didn't fit the local club so they decided to operate under AACA. Ruth was one of the members that was instrumental in that transition from HCCA to AACA. While still operating under the name of HCCA, one of their members, Vernon Nash, passed away in 1986 and the Club voted to rename the Club Vernon L. Nash Antique Auto Club of Fairbanks, in his honor. Ruth was elected Treasurer shortly after that and remained in that position for 16 years. She was a friend to all and kept the club together all those years. She also took care of the Membership for most of those years until the Club got so big. She will be greatly missed by many, especially the older membership who knew her back then. This photo, taken by Bill Chace, is of Ruth & Clain Hill with their 1928 Hupmobile. That 1928 Hupmobile was brought to Fairbanks by Howard Mackey. He later sold it to Ruth & Clain. 
SUNSHINE CLUB NEWS

Dawson City Part II — We Discover Gold

We had an open invitation to tour an active gold mine operation and no trip to the gold fields of the Klondike would be complete without a touch of gold fever. In earlier days, Bill Wright had prospected in Thailand and Yukon Territory with his friend Lee Olynyk. Today, Lee and his wife Wanlee maintain their claim in the Gold Bottom Creek Mining District and were willing to show us around their operation. We drove East of Dawson City about 7 miles and turned off on a side road and headed up through old tailings and remnants of past mining claims. In our driving directions to the claim, we were told that we were to turn off this road and cross the bridge at Hunker Creek and follow the road to the end. Arriving at Hunker Creek, we found the bridge to be in a state of disrepair with part of the bridge deck missing. After a couple minutes of pondering our dilemma, we decided to ford the creek with the Model A's. After all, the creek was only about 60 feet wide! No little creek was going to dampen our gold seeking adventure! As I was waiting my turn to cross the creek, I was wondering why Bill had stopped mid-creek and stepped out on to his car's running board. Surely, this is a strange way to look for gold in the creek bottom! Upon further investigation, I learned that Bill was teaching us that it's hard to suck water into your carburetor and expect a spark to ignite your fuel. Lesson learned, a few minutes later, the car restarted. on to the mine.

We were greeted upon our arrival by Lee and Wanlee and made to feel at home. After our introductions, we traveled to the working area of the claim. This operation turned out to be no small-time venture as there was a bulldozer and an excavator steadily supplying gravel into a sluice box. We were told that the feeding of gravel through this sluice washes about 80 yards of pay dirt per hour for ten hours every day and pumps and recycles about 2800 gallons of water per minute. The sluice is designed to separate gold from rock and other materials depositing the gold in the bottom of the sluice for collection at a latter time. The rock and other material is removed to the tailing pile. Part of the gravel that exits the sluice at this operation is recycled through the sluice and continues to be valuable pay dirt. Operating and maintaining this property keeps Lee and his small crew busy for the 100 days of the mining season each year. Three 25 yard and six 35 yard rock trucks are planned to be added to the operation in 2011 and will haul pay dirt from the additional two miles of upstream claim to the sluicing plant for processing and haul off overburden.

Our gold mining adventure added to the success of our trip and I feel that we were very lucky to see this operation first hand. We thanked our hosts and said good bye and it was back to the cars for the return trip to Dawson City. We learned that there was a new bridge across Hunker Creek a couple hundred yards downstream from our original crossing and this greatly aided our return trip from the mine and eliminated the need to ford the creek a second time. We had one more overnight stay at our hotel and then the return drive to Tok, reload the vehicles and the return drive home.

Everyone on this trip noted one specific part of our adventure. If we had a dollar for every time our picture was taken on the Taylor and Top of the World Highways, we could have paid all our expenses on this trip. As we would watch on-coming cars, people would be snapping pictures out of their windshields or stopping their vehicles, jumping out, setting up tripods and

snapping pictures as we drove by. America does have a love affair with the automobile and this is further proof that these cars, and other great cars will live on in our hearts forever.
