# Always a Winner—The Willis Knight 1930 Model 66B

Bob Merritt brought the car to Fairbanks in the late 1960s. He was the second or third owner, purchasing the car from a Mrs. Haney of Scott City, Kansas, who had kept the car sheltered in a barn for the prior 34 years. The car was ap-

car was apparently just like one owned by Merritt's grandfather.

This was the third Willis-Knight Bob acquired for his collection – first was a

blue1931 WK 87 and next a maroon 1930 WK 70B. The 66B was totally restored, and was flown up to Fairbanks in a C130 cargo plane rather than risk trucking or going by ship. Early on, it was rarely driven, but

second show, a Golden Days car show at Alaskaland in 1972. By that time, Bob Merritt was President of the club. In the two decades that Bob owned and showed the car in Fairbanks, it was always a favorite.

The Merritts left Alaska in the late 80's, and the Willis Knight 66B was sold to Bernie Saupe. Bernie again pampered the car and kept it in heated storage at his Chevron Bulk Plant. When Bernie would enter the car in a local show, it would


