



Tom "Blue" Hinchsliff Director







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# **Renaming Sleeper**

Since our daughter, Jennifer, was very young we have named our vehicles. (Yes, Jen named our first Subaru "Chitty-Chitty-Bang-Bang.") We continue the tradition to this day. When I purchased the severely wrecked 1955 Plymouth as a parts car at auction from the City of Fairbanks, there was no doubt its name was "Sleeper." As a low mileage vintage vehicle (27,773.5 original miles) it was by definition a "sleeper." Plus when you add the fact that its second owner was Dick Sleep, its name had to be "Sleeper." And so it was until.... When I first saw this rust free gem of a car in the spring of 2006 before the accident, Dick Sleep told me he had purchased it from a neighbor lady. (See the full story "Life, Death and Resurrection of our parts car Sleeper" in the April & May 2013 VLNAACF newsletters.) I purchased the wrecked car on September 23, 2006, from the City of Fairbanks. The rumors within our club were the original owner was Mrs. Cox who purchased the car new in Seattle, WA, drove it to Fairbanks with her husband, and she was deceased. After I assisted getting the wheelchair through the soft melting snow into the rear porch of her home, I was invited to look at the photo on the wall. I was amazed. I immediately contacted Ethel's adult caretakers, and once they heard the story of the car they were eager to assist in any way they could. Her caretakers advised that Ethel had moments when she would speak quite a bit, so I armed them with a few basic questions. dressed up for her 95<sup>th</sup> birthday and holding the photo of the Plymouth! I treasure them!

I learned from her obituary that Mary Ethel Ghezzi died peacefully on July 26, 2011, in her home located on the corner of Pioneer and Brandt Streets. She was born in Fairbanks on Feb. 23, 1915, raised in Nenana, but attended and graduated from Fairbanks High School in 1931. She obtained her nursing degree from the Saint Elizabeth Hospital School of Nursing in Yakima, WA on Jan. 14, 1938. Mary Ethel (aka "Ghez") began her nursing career soon after graduation at the old St. Joseph's Hospital when it was a three story wooden building. She was known for her incredible work ethic. She was the first to work every day and the last to leave until December 2000 when she suffered a massive stroke. Her obituary states she apsame determination by walking several miles every day.

In honor of her 59 years of dedicated service, and the fact that during this extensive period Ethel was involved with the care for the majority of Fairbanks area residents, the Fairbanks Memorial Hospital dedicated Room 383ST as the "Miss Ghezzi Room." In this conference room there's a plaque that states "In Honor of Mary Ethel Ghezzi, RN." There's also a framed copy of her diploma and a photograph of Ethel in her hat and uniform as a very attractive young lady. She was a surgical nurse so valued the doctors would have her schedule their surgeries to be certain she could assist. A doctor friend said, "She was totally dedicated to her work - I mean totally. It was her life."

I interviewed several of her hospital cohorts who knew her well. She was highly regarded and loved by all. While in the hospital following her stroke, she was never left alone: fellow staff members watched her 24 hours a day. Years later many of the same people were involved in her

care. She is remembered by all for her professionalism, lovable personality

It is obvious that Mary Ethel proached life after the stroke with the Ghezzi was a wonderful person; we would all be fortunate to have known her and to have such close and dedicated friends. I only wish I could also have known her; I feel as if everybody knew her but me. For example, she nursed our car club member Bub Larson back to health after a load of pipe crushed his foot and my dentist/friend had her as a "delightful patient." I do know she never married but was engaged as a young lady, and none of those I interviewed thought she purchased the car in Seattle. All thought

> the car was purchased new in Fairbanks from the Greimann's who owned the dealership at the time; Dr. Robert Taylor is almost certain of the fact. Ethel offered the car to Dr. James Lundquist because of his interest in old cars; he is currently 90 and said the car was in "as new condition." His son, Peter Lundquist, is a member of our club and remembers accompanying his dad to Ethel's garage and ob-

served "all the tires were flat." The car's mileage is estimated to have been about 15,000 miles at that time. One day early in the restoration process, I was showing the stripped down car to a neighbor whose husband is a doctor. I informed her that this car had spent its entire life here in Fairbanks and was purchased by a Fairbanks nurse who was quite famous locally. Without hesitation my neighbor questioned, "Is this Miss Ghezzi's car?" At that instance I knew the car's name was "Miss Ghezzi."

In retrospect, should I have listened to the practical advice that it would be far too expensive to restore this car? The prudent answer is. "absolutely." The emotional response is the one I gave to a chap at the 2014 Jay Osfthun Show and Shine in Anchorage last August who asked after looking at the photos of the wrecked car, "What gave you the idea you could restore this car?" I smiled and responded, "I had the parts and it was all emotion, I just wanted this Fairbanks rust free car to survive." We're delighted with the car; she drives like a dream with her power steering and new "slippers." Although she's pretty enough to be a trailer gueen and the reality is we will never recoup the money we put into the restoration, our attitude is why not drive her? And we do! She carried us over 3,000 miles last summer - we're all smiles & love our Miss Ghezzi! She's a beautiful and useful survivor!
