TAKE THE BUS!

Busses started rolling up the Alcan just about as soon as it was (almost) passable - just the year after the Alcan's completion, celebrated at MP 588 Contact Creek. The highway was through in September, 1942 and bus service started in June, 1943. The first busses were under contract to the Northwest Service Command by Western Canadian Greyhound, Ltd. That lasted a year.

In the fall of 1944, the U.S. Army began running its own fleet of "busses", and the next spring set up the White Pass & Yukon Railroad with the service. By fall, the WP&YR added four new Hicks busses built on Dodge chassis' and set up a subsidiary company (the British Yukon Navigation Company) to run them. They ran busses twice each week from Dawson Creek to Whitehorse—a one-way ticket was \$50 and took two nights and three days with overnight stops near Watson Lake and at Fort Nelson. and with rest stops promised every 50 miles. In 1946, after the highway was fully opened into Alaska for civilian travel. the WP&YR also established lodges along the route. The trip from Whitehorse to Fairbanks took two days with a stop at the lodge at Beaver Creek. That service ran for twenty years, until August of 1965 when the White Pass sold the service to their competitor, Canadian Coachways.

You can still travel by bus. It's still slow. It is expensive, and most of the lodges are closed.

DUES

Dues are now **PAST DUE** for the 2017 year. They are payable by returning payment to the club post office box (preferred), dropping it off at Larson's Locksmith, or bringing payment to the next club meeting. Dues are to be paid by December 31 for the following year.—If not paid by March 1st, unpaid members are reviewed by the Board and dropped from newsletter distribution, National AACA, and our VLNAACF membership rolls.

Individual Dues are \$50.00 \$35.00 for National AACA (paid through our local club), and \$15.00 for local dues Joint Membership dues are \$65.00 \$35.00 for National AACA (paid through our local club), and \$30.00 for local dues for you and your associate or spouse



President's Headlights

A report by the membership secretary during the January board meeting of the VLNAACF indicated that 47 members (about 20% of the club) had not paid their dues by the December 31st due date. Dues for the National

AACA are collected along with the club dues resulting in late payment of them also and the subscription to the AACA Magazine. This results in extra work for the membership secretary having to follow up with members and report to National AACA. It also means more work for the treasurer paving late dues to National AACA. Some members don't pay their dues until they want to participate in one of the three member-only events--Carlson Center Car Show, Golden Days' Parade or the Annual Meeting much later in the year.

To address this problem, a motion was made to levy a \$10.00 fine for late payment of dues (after December. 31, 2017) with a grace period extending the due date until the first general membership meeting in January. The motion was seconded, followed by a discussion. A vote was held and the motion passed.

Dues remain the same as before unless paid after the January meeting, in which case a \$ 10.00 fine will be added. This is not meant to generate additional income or become a budget item. It was done as an administrative action which the club elected the board to handle.

The hope is that everyone pays on time and we don't collect any fines. The fine of \$10.00 will be added for any person who was once a member and re-joins or anyone who pays after the January general membership meeting. Thus, if you wait until one of the three member-only events to pay your dues or after the January meeting the \$10.00 fine will be added to the cost. It will cost you \$75.00 instead of the regular \$65.00 (or as a single member \$60.00 instead of \$50.00).

As in all prior years, if you have not paid your dues by the March Board Meeting, the board will formally drop your name from the membership rolls of the Vernon Nash Region and the AACA. As with National we will keep a record of your membership number, and if you decide to re-join (or pay late) then the \$10.00 fee will be assessed in addition to the regular dues.

ers me is "How can I afford this hobby?" My answer is standard - there are many affordable collector cars available. No one has to start with a perfect Full Classic to enjoy our hobby.

I started with a 1966 Chevrolet Corvair convertible that my parents bought new as their first "second car". While being reliable, inexpensive transportation, Corvairs are regularly available for sale.

Chevrolet's "waterless wonder" came in multiple body styles including a two-door coupe, four- door sedan, convertible and station wagon, as well as the passenger van, ramp-side pickup and panel truck. Engines and transmissions can be swapped among all models.

Options included turbo-charged engines, power convertible tops, telescopic steering wheels, and automatic transmissions.

Most of the mechanical parts needed to restore a Corvair are being reproduced and can be purchased on the internet and delivered to you with- in days. Even the most difficult to find trim parts can be located at the Hershey flea market.

Corvairs can be purchased in average condition for slightly more than the original 1960's list prices. They are an excellent entry level car for a young person to actively participate in our hobby. The Corvair's large trunk provides ample storage room for touring.

The timeless Corvair styling is always noticed so the Corvair owner must be ready to enjoy dis- cussing his car with others. It seems everyone used to own one or had a relative who did.

If there wasn't a Corvair in your past, maybe there will be one in your future.

These short cuts and repairshop kinks are taken from the 1918 book of the above title as published by the U.P.C. Book Company

Aligning Main Bearings

(No. 247)

Whether the main bearings are in alignment or not can be determined by means of a surface gauge. This is an instrument which measures the distance between the top of the crankcase and each bearing, and is therefore nothing more than a caliper. It has a broad, flat, base, which may be placed on the surface of the crankcase and the pointer is brought into contact with one of the bearings, then it is moved along to the other bearings to determine whether these surfaces are higher or lower. To make sure of the accuracy of this method the trueness of the crankcase surface must first be checked by a straight edge. Another method which may be used, providing the bearing boxes are in line, is to remove the bearings and caliper them. If they are all the same thickness the crankshaft must be in alignment, but if otherwise it is out of true. - G. B. Cortelyou, New York
