



President's Headlights - Mike Lecol Chick

I have learned that ethanol blend gas and old cars do not go together unless you do some upgrades. As most of you know, early this year I added a 1946 Ford to my collection. I bought the car locally but understood that it had come up from Washington state where they have ethanol blend gas.

On the evening of staging for the June car show it wouldn't start. A few days later I found that the diaphragm in the electric fuel pump was just a sticky, gooey blob. After replacing the electric fuel pump the car was back on the road...that is until July 12...the Wednesday night run around. One of the car club members told me that my car was leaking a lot of oil. This seemed a little strange because it had not been a problem before.

After pulling into my garage I checked under the car and found a puddle that was not there before. A check showed that it was gas. I raised the hood, started the car and gas gushed from the back of the mechanical fuel pump. I shut the car off and cleaned up the gas. As some of you know, the mechanical fuel pump on a flathead Ford is located on the crankcase breather on the top rear of the engine (it is common to remove the pump rod and run the fuel through the fuel bowl). The gasket had been installed incorrectly allowing the gas to gush out. If it had been installed properly the gas would have gone into the crankcase.

I removed the fuel pump and inspected the diaphragm. Unlike the diaphragm in the electric fuel pump, it appeared good but on closer inspection the rubber was degraded allowing fuel to flow through. Rebuilding the fuel pump corrected the problem. Both problems were caused by ethanol blend fuel. New replacement parts are available that will withstand the ethanol blend fuel. So if you get a car from the lower 48 or plan to drive your older car in the lower 48 you may want to check the rubber products in contact with the ethanol blend fuel.

Ok, now that I've vented I'd like to thank everyone for the great job of selling all the raffle tickets for our car. I'd also like to thank Ralph Glasgow and Melinda Harris and the Howling Dog for hosting our last club meeting.



Jig for Cotter Holes (No. 411)

A jig for drilling cotter pin holes in bolts and pins may be made of a piece of square stock in which there are several transverse holes for receiving various sizes of pins or bolts. At right angles to each one of these is a hole through which the cotter pin drill is inserted. Wilma gave us a report on the club logo. To receive the price of \$40 we need to have a minimum order of 25.


Rochelle gave us a report on the logo merchandise. The people that ordered their jackets

Fire Extinguishers - What's the big deal?

So, when's the last time you saw flames erupt at a car show, right? Other than ones painted on a rod

Well, in my experience, I'm happy to have had an extinguisher handy when I needed it. A number of years ago, I set out for a local cruise night in my 1963 Imperial. As I maneuvered into a parking space, a soft bang and a loss of much-needed steering boost resulted from the high pressure hose bursting. Hot steering fluid sprayed on a hot exhaust manifold meant flames—and not the painted kind. I suppose I could have run over to the Home Depot and bought an extinguisher and I might have beat the Fire Department to the scene...

As I had an extinguisher on the floor by the passenger seat, I was able to quickly douse the flames with minimal collateral damage. I drove the car home and did not make the 10 o'clock news.

At a meet in Nebraska, while a steam car was being fired up, some leaking gas caught fire. Not a big conflagration, but nearby extinguishers kept a disaster at bay. So another good reason to have a fully charged fire extinguisher at the ready is to keep someone else's problem from spreading to your car.

I know some like to keep their extinguisher in the trunk, even held in by a bracket. I have a challenge for you. Have a friend time you as you start from the drivers seat, grab the keys, run around back, open the trunk and free the fire extinguisher from its' bracket and then head back up front to where the problem is. Compare that to reaching under the seat to grab the extinguisher. The cost of a five pound fire extinguisher is nothing compared to the damage that can be prevented when it's available to put to use immediately.

So, you have one for the kitchen, on the way to the basement and one or more hanging in the garage, right?

Time flies, and we are most of the way through our "peak" season. It seems to me that participation is down this year, though. I would

hope our board spends some real effort to try and figure out why our membership is increasing, while our participation in events has declined significantly. The July membership meeting is a good example—40 members is only 17% of our membership. The picnic on Golden Days weekend was by far the best attended event—but it was still far less than half our members. Also seems we've had too many events without leadership, or cancelled this year without replacement activities, and that too needs to be addressed for next year.

When touring, it is hard to know what spare parts to bring and what not to bring. Like Mike (see Pres. Headlights), I was glad to have a spare electric fuel pump along on the ABDT. I have one installed in-line with the mechanical pump to remedy vapor lock or other reasons for occasional fuel starvation. On the way up to the Yukon River Bridge, I was having to push that under-dash button for the electric pump often enough that I was convinced the in-line fuel filter at the carburetor was plugged, so I changed it at our lunch stop. The new filter made no difference and the problem kept getting worse on the hills until the car just stopped, with no gas to the carburetor half-way up the biggest grade this side of Finger Mountain. The electric pump had failed. Ralph Glasgow towed me to the top (and thus out of traffic), and I "got out and got under" and put in the spare electric pump. That got me going, but it didn't fix the problem. At Wiseman, I borrowed Clutch Lounsbury's air compressor and blew out the fuel line back to the tank-and wow, the car ran like new afterward on just the mechanical pump. But, by the time I got home it was again giving fuel starvation problems on hills and on rapid acceleration. I found out there is a screen on the fuel pickup inside the tank—guess there is always something new to learn about our vehicles.

I was certainly glad to see Roy Wilbur out and about again on his month young two new knees at the Picnic at Golden Days!
