The story was published in its entirety in the Willys Overland Knight Registry magazine in the spring of that year.

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I fell asleep last night reading old newsletters, and I woke this morning with back issues



The Wild Adventures of Frank Montgomery An AUTO-biography November 02, 2020 Originally printed in the AACA North Central Florida Region

You asked for a little about me, Alaska, and how I became a car nut. Hmm, well, first I was born... and then I wanted a car.

My father was a Civil Servant employed by the Dept. of the Navy throughout WWII and the Korean Conflict. A civilian with Chief's rating, his trade was Refrigeration Engineer. He got off his ship in Sitka and took a posting with the Territory of Alaska at Alaska Cold Storage. That's how I came to be born in Sitka, Alaska in 1953. In 54 Dad moved us to Anchorage, Alaska when he took a Supv. Engineer job at Ft. Richardson.

We lived in Anchorage's first effort at suburbia: Nunaka Valley. Just across the street from our cracker box house was a family by the name of Borders. Bud Borders was an avid dirt track racer. He raced 40s/50s modified circle trackers. His little girl also raced a midget sprint car. They had two or three race cars and a couple of midget cars in their driveway and front yard. I was only around 4-6 years old, but as just a little guy I was pretty impressed. That's probably where it started.

In 1960, Dad moved us down to the Kenai Peninsula to Sterling, Alaska where we homesteaded 160 acres on the NW corner of Robinson Loop Road. He bought an old military surplus Case tractor that had been an aircraft tug at Elmendorf AFB. Oddly, it had live PTO. He bought an old twobottom plow, a four-gang disc, and a large Ag style tiller. He put me on that tractor when I was around 8 or 9 and we put in about 50 acres of hay. A few years later he bought a second tractor, an Allis Chalmers WD-45 with its secondary clutch that worked so well for maintaining implement speed yet reducing ground speed if necessary. Loved that old tractor. Seems like I lived on it for several summers. Maybe this is where it started.

Dad was a GMC man. He had a number of Advanced Design trucks. I don't remember all the model years, but mostly early 50's. None of them were new. A few were a bit rough, but one was really nice. (That's the one I rolled when I was only 11. Oh, you want to hear that story? It would take too long. But, it has to do with the "corner of Robinson Loop Road" I mentioned before.) So, I learned to drive in Dad's old pickups probably around age 9 or 10. Maybe this is where it started.

How did I acquire the car bug? Maybe it was the crusty old homesteader that used to drift his red 53 Mercury like an early NAS-CAR driver around the corner in front of our house. You could hear the gravel splashing and pinging off his car long before his car

was pretty impressed. Maybe it was the older pole, but I thought I had died and gone to boys up the road. A die-hard Ford family. One heaven. Best job I had ever had up to that of the brothers had a 49 Shoebox and a 61 Starliner. One brother had a 68 Torino. Maybe it was another classmate's family who were Production Operator. Eight years later in dyed-in-the-wool Buick people. They drove 50s 1983, I went to work for Arco Alaska as an era Buicks and restored several 30s era Operator on the Alaska North Slope, Kuparuk Buicks. At that time I didn't even know what River Operations. Very exciting times in "restored" meant. Their Dad had an old style Alaska. I was really happy to be able to get in mechanics shop named Moose Horn Garage, on the ground floor of something so new and He introduced me to Hemmings Motor News back when it was a little monthly publication about the size of a Reader's Digest.

I dragged a 57 Buick Special home one day. Big plans. My Mom was so proud. Had a three girls and we stored our eight cars. Girls rod sticking out the side of the block. That car in the house, of course, and the "boys" out in never got past square #1 and sat on the farm for years till Mom had it dragged away when I was in college.

Chevy 3100 Custom cab. "Custom" might be a when we bought them. stretch, lest you think it was nice or something. Hardly. A touch rough actually. Paid \$75 for it. Having been badly injured in a motorcycle/auto accident in July of 69, I was unable to use my left foot. These old trucks had both Choke and Throttle pulls on the dash. I could advance the Throttle a bit, clutch with my right foot, and get rolling. The rest was trucker-style major oil companies had relaxed their inwith no clutch. Got pretty good at that.

By around 7th/8th grade I was pretty much a car nut. My bedroom was full of models. I read everything I could find about the car scene in the States. Loved the Customs, Gassers, Dragsters. I was in to Rat Fink, which my Dad did not like at all!

Summer of 71, before my Senior year of HS, I bought a low mile 70 El Camino. It was an L48 350 with M20 (300 hp and 4 spd). To ule and we moved to Gainesville the fall of me, as a 17 year old kid, I felt like the luckiest guy in the world. But not just because of my car.

That summer was also very special to me because I met Ramona K. Crumpacker. Her family moved from Kent, Washington to Kenai, Alaska where her father became the pastor of our church there. She and I did our Senior year at that time. We drove to Haines, Alaska got together at Kenai Central High School, graduating in 1972. That fall she, her brother, and I went to Bible College together in Portland, Oregon. Ramona and I married in August of 1974. While in college we drove our 70 El Camino. Patch. I never really thought we'd be able to Several of my friends at school were car nuts as well and we did our fair share of wrenching ka, but somehow the shop has filled up a bit and bench racing.

By the time I was out of college and we'd been married a year or two, the El Camino was pretty tired. Sold it. Bought a used 73 Capri. Fun little car. Drove it to Alaska when we moved home in 76. It was not a very good Alaska car. And the winter-time wreck didn't ing, driving, and enjoying, but very little mehelp it either.


