### **Dawson City / Eagle Long-Distance Tour**

We have at least 5 and possibly 8 vehicles committed for this summer's long-distance tour. There are still rooms available at each of our stays during the trip, and others are encouraged to join. The group leaves Fairbanks on Thursday, June 29th, stops in Tok, and then arrives Dawson City on the evening of June 30th. Arrangements are made for the group to participate in the Canada Day parade on July 1st, and for a car show at the Festival Grounds after the parade – the festival is an old-time community festival with speeches, games, cake, and refreshments. On the 3rd of July the group is off to Eagle, Alaska, arriving in time for the Historical Society dinner at the Order of Redman Hall; there is a community fund raising auction afterwards. On the 4th is an old-fashioned Independence Day celebration, with speeches at the Wickersham Courthouse, parade, and festivities. The group leaves Eagle on the morning of the 5th, again stopping in Tok and arriving back to Fairbanks on the 6th.

### AUTOMOBILE SHOW HAS GALA OPENING ON FRIDAY NIGHT

# Over Three Hundred Persons View Latest Models Mayor De La Vergne Opens Show

The first annual Fairbanks automobile show, which has the distinction of being the farthest north show of its kind in the world, had a colorful opening at the Moose Auditorium last night. Over 300 persons attended the show to view the 13 cars placed on exhibition by members of the Fairbanks Automobile Dealers Association.

Mayor F. de la Vergne officially opened the show shortly after 8 o'clock with a brief talk in which he outlined it's purpose and traced the general development of motor vehicles in Alaska.

For the next three hours enthusiastic crowds passed in and out of the Auditorium, gathering in interested groups about the hosts models of the 9 important motor companies represented at the show. The hall was brilliantly lighted, showing off the automobiles to the best advantage. Judging from the cars exhibited, in 1928 the trend is away from open cars, with the exception of sport models, and toward one seat and two-seat closed types, with special emphasis on body lines. Many mechanical improvements were noted as well.

The new Dodge, as exemplified by the Victory Six entered by the Northern Commercial company, attracted a great deal of favorable comment.

The next section was occupied by a Studebaker Dictator sedan and it's smaller brother, the Erskine Six. These cars are exhibited by Galen & Sheldon, while Romeo Hoyt was kept busy demonstrating the many new features incorporated in the Studebaker as well as showing the Erskine to those who had not seen it before.

Adjoining this section was the space reserved for the Service Motor company, which has entered a Hudson sedan and a Chrysler sport roadster. These were among the most beautiful cars in the hall and were surrounded during the evening by numbers of visitors.

A Buick sport sedan and a Ford Tudor sedan occupied the stage, which was reserved for the Samson Hardware company. The Buick was received only recently and had not been previously seen by the public. It carries on the best traditions of the Buick craftsmanship, combining a rakish appearance with the sturdy build of the regular models. The Ford, of course, was a gathering point for motor enthusiasts, as it has been ever since it was received by the Samson company.

As the visitor left the stage he next came to the section in which the Fairbanks Agency company displayed a Standard Six Nash sedan and a Falcon-Knight sedan. The latter car was the first of it's kind seen here and was closely examined. It is powered by the famous sleeve valve motor which has previously been seen only in the Willy-Knight line. With it's beautiful body and many other attractive features, naturally it was the center of attention for many of the visitors.

Fred B. Johnston displayed a Chevrolet sedan and a Chevrolet coupe, the latest models of the Chevrolet division of General Motors. Noticeable were the improved lines, including the narrow and long radiator. The improvements in the motor are no less marked, although less apparent.

Continuing towards the exit the visitor was then attracted by two Oldsmobile sedans, exhibited by the Standard Garage company. These cars are marked by lines making the body appear considerably longer, the cowling is more graceful, and the interior appointments are similar to those found in the highest priced cars.

The music provided by Charles F. Cann contributed in no small margin to the success of the show on the opening night. Amplifiers connected with a phonograph made the music easily audible in all parts of the hall.

Three hundred and two persons registered at the show last night, and a considerable number neglected the opportunity to do so.

registration confers no obligations but on the other hand gives the registrant a chance for the three prizes which are to be offered. The association desires to have everyone register in order to find out just how much interest is being taken in the show.

There is no admission charge. Everyone registering is given a ticket entitling them to a chance on one of the prizes. The drawings will be held tomorrow afternoon. First prize is 50 gallons of gasoline, second prize the same and third five gallons of cylinder oil. Visitors may, and in fact are requested to, once on each day of the show, thus increasing their chances for a prize. No one may register more than once each day. The show opens for the second night a 8 p.m. today. Tomorrow is the last day of the show, which opens at 2 p.m. and continues until 6.
