My summer of fun was cut a little short when I needed to have my gallbladder removed and a hernia fixed. I'm fine and on the road to recovery. It is just frustrating when you are under a 15-pound lifting restriction for 6 weeks. It is going to be interesting to see if at least some of my projects are done before the white sunshine begins falling on us.

One of the fun projects I would like to get to is a 74 Ford F250 that my uncle gave to my son. It was his mining truck up by Central Hot Springs. When he retired and moved to Deer Park (by Spokane) the truck made several trips up and down the Alcan. Last year it was finally returned to the starting point in Alaska. There are several fun aspects of working on his truck. Working at a remote mining site, my uncle used Cat parts to work on the truck. For example, a normal negative ground bolt to the block is a 3/8" bolt. In this truck it is 3/4". Try finding a new cable that can accommodate that size bolt... There have developed a few leaks that need to be fixed, but that too is a chore. Not because of having to remove parts to replace seals but because he cornered the market on Form-A-Gasket. The valve covers and oil pan are basically glued in place. I ordered new valve covers just in case. It made sense since there were no auto parts stores near Central. With a big 360 under the hood, we did discover that, with the saddle tanks he put on the truck, we were able to traverse the entire 2500 miles from Eastern Washington to Fairbanks without having to fill up.

I would challenge each of you to write a small bit for the newsletter with a story about your vehicles. The backgrounds stories about an antique vehicle can be as fun as the vehicle themselves. My uncle's truck has a great story. My 49 Ford F1 is a family heirloom. Bought by my great-Grandfather and passed down until it is now mine. My 49 Ford F2 was intended to be a parts truck for the F1 but we discovered it was in great shape. My wife disputed how much it cost to restore but then I reminded her that the five years of no tax refunds I told her about were actually great returns that went to the truck. Yes, I got that look.

We all have stories about a trip or just the car that took us there. Send in an article and let us all enjoy.

I should not forget to remind that now that the weather is turning and the snow bunnies are looking at heading south, we need to remember that it is also important during the winter months to attend (in some fashion) the membership meetings so that the club may continue to conduct business.



A few things for your consideration:

Election update:

A committee has been formed to poll the membership seeking candidates for our upcoming election for Officers and Directors. Larry Zervos, Doug Davis, and Bruce McIntosh have volunteered to conduct a phone survey of the members. This will take place over the next couple of weeks, so expect a call from one of these gentlemen and seriously consider agreeing to serve. Positions up for election are President, Vice-President, Treasurer, and Secretary. These are 1 year terms with a 2 term limit on the Presidents position and no limits on the others. There are also 2 Board of Director positions which are 2 year terms with no term limits.

Annual Charity Donation:

There has been discussion of changing the annual charity donation to a scholarship focusing on supporting young people interested in entering the automotive trades (mechanic, body repair, etc.). After much discussion we realize this is going to require much consultation with the appropriate educator groups and the high schools in our area, so we will probably not have the methods in place to award a scholarship this year. It will possibly be available in the spring of 2024, but most likely will be late 2024 or early 2025. The bottom line here is let's reach out for letters from local charities as we have in the past. The criterion is unchanged, you will need to submit a nomination letter and a letter from the charity explaining their role in the community. The BOD will review the applicants and present a ballot in November.
